Eight principles for patient-centered and family-centered care for newborns in the neonatal intensive care unit

- 1 Free 24 hours a day parental access with no limitations due to staff shift or medical rounds
- (2) Psychological support for parents
- (3) Pain management
- 4 Supportive environment
- (5) Postural support
- (6) Skin-to-skin contact
- 7 Breast feeding and lactation support
- 8 Sleep protection




"Understanding the premature infant" - a parent guidebook-

NIDCAP Care plans

- ♦ Parents are equal partners in the baby`s care
- ❖ Support the parents by teaching and guiding them how to understand their premature baby`s behavioral language






Individual NIDCAP plan posted at Tobias` bedside


Support parents in their role as primary caregivers

Studies link parents presence with better outcome for the baby and reduced length of stay









♦ Individual posters at the bed space include NIDCAP plan, Kangaroo time

Supportive environment

- ♦ Controlling the quality of the NICU environment is crucial for the preterm
- Sensory stimuli impact quality of sleep and can alter brain development
- ♦ Reduce sensory stimuli by adjusting light and decreasing sound
- ★ Early exposure to the parents` voice is important for the infant`s cognitive and language development








Kangaroo Care simple and effective for the whole family

- ♦ Birth Kangaroo: premature delivery from GA. 32 place the baby skin to skin with the mother right after birth
- ♦ Minimal disturbance, nurse monitor baby's vital signs, give the first meal within one hour- usually mothers own milk, CPAP breathing support, if needed
- ♦ After two hours transferred together to the NICU, where KMC is continued by the mother or father
- ♦ Families with Kangaroo care at birth is often fully breastfed sooner and go home earlier



Sleep Protection





- ♦ Sleep is important for brain and neurosensory development
- ♦ Wait until he wakes up to do Care procedures if possible
- ♦ Stay with the baby and support him until he fall asleep

Postural support and individual nests

- ♦ The womb support flexed midline posture and movements in the fetus
- ♦ After birth appropriate individual support might
 - ♦ Help the baby to achieve a flexed midline position
 - ♦ Support self-regulation and save energy
 - ♦ Promote calmness and support sleep
 - ♦ Support thermoregulation
 - ♦ Promote physiological stability





Slow and gentle handling

- ♦ Consider timing for procedures
- ♦ Individualize care to the infant
- ♦ Greet the baby
- ♦ Slow handling and support during care and positioning
- ♦ Swaddle the baby in soft blankets
- ♦ Give the baby a break as needed
